Phase 3 School Slow Zones – Spring 2024

What is a school slow zone?

A school slow zone is a permanent 20 mile-per-hour speed limit on a neighborhood street within 600 feet of a key access point to a school. The 20mph speed limit in these zones are enforceable all day, every day—whether school is in session or not.

In early 2022, the County installed <u>demonstration</u> <u>school slow zones</u> at 13 schools. <u>Community</u> <u>feedback</u> on these slow zone demonstrations was positive. Therefore, we finalized our <u>school zone</u> <u>guidelines</u> and installed a <u>second phase of slow</u> <u>zones</u> at an additional 14 schools in Spring 2023.

The school slow zone installation process includes retrofitting the entire school zone to ensure high visibility crossings and school zone signage within the school zone, as well as appropriate speed limits on the school's beaconed arterial roadways.
