

A Visit from the Virginia Superintendent of Public Instruction

Yesterday morning, MPSA was visited by **Dr. Lisa Coons**, the Virginia State Superintendent of Public Education. Dr. Coons, based at the Virginia Department of Education in Richmond, was visiting Arlington just for the morning, and MPSA is one of the 3 schools she was touring. She also visited Alice West Fleet and Claremont Immersion. Accompanied by Dr. Jeremy Raley (VDOE Chief of Staff), Dr. Francisco Duran (APS Superintendent) and Catherine Ashby (APS Assistant Superintendent of School and Community Relations), she visited Ms. Bruno and Ms. Kain's Primary classrooms; Ms. Joshi & Ms. Rubilotta's LEM classrooms; and ended with visits to Ms. Collier's and Ms. Lopatkiewicz's UEM classrooms. Opportunities to Bridge SEL from School to Home

Families will often ask, "How can we practice social-emotional skills with our kids at home?" Social-emotional competencies can easily be taught, practiced, and reinforced at home in a way that feels natural and even fun. The best approach is to model and practice these skills for children in a way that feels authentic. What follows are some suggestions for working on each of these social-emotional skills at home.

Cooperation: One way to think about cooperation is the idea of working with others toward a common goal. Consider collaborating on projects that can be completed as a family. **Teachable Moment**: Solve an age-appropriate puzzle together. One approach is to assign jobs. For example, have some family members find the edges while others locate the middle pieces.

Assertiveness: Assertiveness can be defined as the ability to take initiative, to stand up for one's ideas without hurting or negating others, to seek help, to persevere with a challenging task, and to recognize one's individual self as separate from the environment, circumstances, or conditions one is in.

Assertiveness is about clear and respectful communication and is a useful skill when conflicts and disagreements arise. Teachable Moment: Teach assertive sentence starters such as "I see it this way". "Right now I am feeling like I want to" and "I respect your opinion, and I have a different perspective about that".

Responsibility: Messaging to children that they are capable and able to depend on themselves helps to boost their confidence and self-esteem in academic and social settings. Practicing responsibility at home offers many opportunities to build that skill. **Teachable Moment**: Help your children pack their lunch and snacks (with guidance).

Empathy: Think of empathy as feeling with someone. Empathy helps build connections with one another and strengthens relationships, and it plays a critical role in shaping how we share experiences, how we perceive others' emotions, and the extent to which we can see the world from another's perspective. **Teachable Moment**: Model and encourage empathy skills by sharing what you notice about other people's feelings. For example, "My friend Rachel seemed really sad today. I checked in with her and she shared that her sister has a cold. She seemed worried about her sister."

Self-Control: Self-control can be seen as the ability to recognize and regulate one's thoughts, emotions, and behaviors in order to be successful in the moment and remain on a successful trajectory. **Teachable Moment**: Model your thought process and decisions based on self-control. For example: "I really want this whole chocolate cake because it looks so yummy. But I'm going to practice self-control and have just a slice instead" or "I notice I am starting to feel frustrated. I want to maintain my composure. I think I'll stop, sit down, and take a few deep breaths so I can be my best self when I handle this challenge".

There are plenty of times during a family's day-to-day living that offer opportunities to practice social and emotional skills. Families who make the effort to do so will not only help reinforce what is learned in school but will also positively influence relationships within the family.



Drive SAFER + Attendance Reminders

Some dangerous and selfish maneuvers are still happening during drop off and pick up. We understand that people may be in a rush, but that is no excuse to

- Double park, often blocking other cars and the roadway.
- Cutting the line, because you are impatient or running late.
- Parking in the kiss-and-ride and walking your child to the door instead of finding appropriate parking so you don't hold up the line. (And doing the same at pick up.)
- Crossing the road in the middle of the street instead of walking to a crosswalk.
- Speeding through the parking lot to drop off to or pick up from school/Extended Day.
- Ignoring or yelling at staff trying to correct/prevent you from the above behaviors.

Adults are supposed to be the example – your children are watching you break rules and exhibit these behaviors that not only put others at risk but put them at risk as well. **Do not be the reason we have to call the police or, even worse, an ambulance.**
